- Lexical taxonomies such as hyponymy and metonymy in thesaurus

10. Course objective:

In this course, students will learn to

- Be able to cultivate creativity in language, which is extremely effective in their upcoming
 careers. The course will also develop their critical thinking as well as general reading and
 writing, which is valuable in everyone's life. Creating good interpersonal relations as an
 outcome of using language in a more organized and persuasive way is another skill that is
 achieved upon successful completion of the course.
- Be acquainted with basic elements of morphology and lexicology in English language. A
 number of crucial features of these two sub-disciplines are also provided. During the
 course, students will be provided with morphological knowledge needed to analyse
 morphemes, simple, complex, and compound words and also methods of forming new
 words. Lexicology methods will also be covered.
- Enable students to become familiar with new words, whether in conversation or in written English and how to form new words based on various morphemes present in English language. The second aim is to teach students methods in lexicology such as dictionaries, thesaurus, and collocations and to enable them use the knowledge later.
