| 9. Course overview: After the restoration of Charles II to the English throne in |  |  |
| 1660, a new age begins in England during which literature, specifically poetry,  |  |  |
| flourishes enormously. The age is generally called Neoclassicism because writers |  |  |
| simply looked back to the classical writers for guidance and inspiration.        |  |  |
| Neoclassicism includes three sub-periods that are recognized with multiple       |  |  |

names among the historians and literary writers and readers.

After the end of Neoclassicism in England, there was a transitional period during which few notable writers left their footprints in the history of English literature with their balanced and well-written poetic works that contain elements of both Neoclassicism and the Romantic age that was not yet announced publically in England.

In 1798, Wordsworth and Coleridge publish the Lyrical Ballads that contain a series of poems written in the spirit of Romanticism which functioned as a manifesto and the touchstone of Romanticism in the beginning of the nineteenth century.

In this course, the events, the important publications, the society in all its colours, the poets and the poems are studied in a gradual but well-planed sequence of lectures that aim at familiarization of students with almost everything that they need to know about these two great ages in English history and literature

## 10. Course objective:

In this course, students are prepared to understand the historical, political, religious, social, national, and literary backgrounds of the events, changes and most importantly the poems that they study throughout the course. They are equipped with necessary literary terms and poetic techniques or devices to make sense of the lines of verse that they are studying.

The course also aims at making the students familiar with both literary ages (Neoclassicism and Romanticism) and almost all the well-known poets during the above mentioned ages.

The students are taught and trained to critically read, appreciate, and analyze the poems that they study. The course aims at sharpening their thinking and enriching their expressions as they are often asked to express their ideas and thoughts about lines and poems in general.

11. Student's obligation: Students are expected to prepare the requires topics that are studied during the lecture after the links or studying materials have been sent to them at least few days in advance. All students are required to attend each and every class of poetry because attendance is one of the very strict parts of the policy of the department. Students are required to take notes

during the lectures and answer questions or do any other assignment that the lecturer sees as important or necessary. Students are also required to fulfill assignments given by the lecturer at home, and their daily participation is highly recommended. Participation can be in form of answering questions, explaining, expressing a viewpoint or presenting a seminar or a topic in an unlimited timespan during the lecture. There will be quizzes, short term examinations, examinations and do-it-at-home exercises to evaluate the overall achievements of the students and make amendments to adapt the lectures to meet their needs.
