### **10.** Course overview:

The importance of the history of architecture for student is that in the first two parts Islamic architecture has a wide content that architects must know especially those concerned with concepts and philosophy that needed to be perceived to form a back ground to produce a rational contemporary architecture.

The course outline shall follow a chronological study of architecture as it develops over the following Islamic periods: from the Prophet period to Ottoman period. We will be studying examples of Islamic architecture from a wide variety of times and places.

Though we are interested in how buildings relate to their specific historical and cultural contexts. The periods including name, location of buildings, stylistic, technological features and deepen understanding of functional, structural, and aesthetic principles of architecture of the period, so the student will be able to evaluate the evolution of Islamic architecture across the centuries, and learning skills in visual and formal analysis of architecture,

# 11. Course objective:

- 1-To explore and focus on such culture and civilization that spread along the Islamic governance between China and Spain a long century since the Prophet Mohammad's mission up to date.
- 2-The student will be introduced to city concept, its characteristics and main styles, traditional Masjid, mausoleum, palace, its relation with environment, culture and human role in developing Islamic buildings and link with the religion.
- 3-The student will learn how to calculate the space program for Masjid according to number of worshipers.
- 3- The student will be introduced to different styles and attitudes that could be classified in Rachides' Umayyad, Abbasid, Fatimid, Ayyubid and Mamluk, Mogul, Timor, Safavid, Othman, and Modern Islamic Architecture and concentrate on the main elements and characters that used in that periods.
- 4-Using a historical element as a tool of communication in their projects.
- 5-To integrate Islamic architectural history with the student's approach to design and-to create an understanding of architecture as a physical response to human need at a philosophical and cultural value within that period.

# 12. Student's obligation

- The participation of the students for the lecture is a basic and crucial point for the enrichment of the course.
- In general students have to get ready for each successive lectures as each lecture are related to the other, therefore one of the main factors to obtain enough knowledge from the lecture is not being absent even for a lesson.
- Another important role of the students is the participation in the daily discussion of the topics given by the teacher.
- Due to the philosophical and theoretical nature of the course, students need to contribute in the lectures through asking questions, giving opinions and even with bringing new ideas.
