### **Course overview**

- 1. Literary criticism includes four processes; reading, thinking, discussing, and writing. Its practical pedagogical importance lies in its tendency to enhance these activities and thereby improve the student's ability to perform them.
- 2. Careful reading increases the ability of the students in terms of vocabulary, general verbal sensitivity and sophistication.
- 3. Studying criticism sharpens thinking skills and increases the student's ability to express thoughts orally. The teacher can then use these processes to stimulate in students the desire to organize and record thoughts in writing.
- 4. Thus the study of literature can be seen as practical intellectual discipline. It directly involves the student in the analysis of difficult literary texts, and this will lead to develop verbal skills which are transferable to other contexts. In comprehend, and analyze other kinds of texts (newspapers, reports, briefs, etc.). This will help the students have a better understanding of the world around them.
- 5. Literary criticism increases knowledge in an active, intellectually challenging way that other more passive activities, a thorough grounding in literature automatically provides knowledge of literary heritage while at the same time increasing the student's awareness of cultural values, history, sociology, psychology, and almost every branch of human knowledge.
