

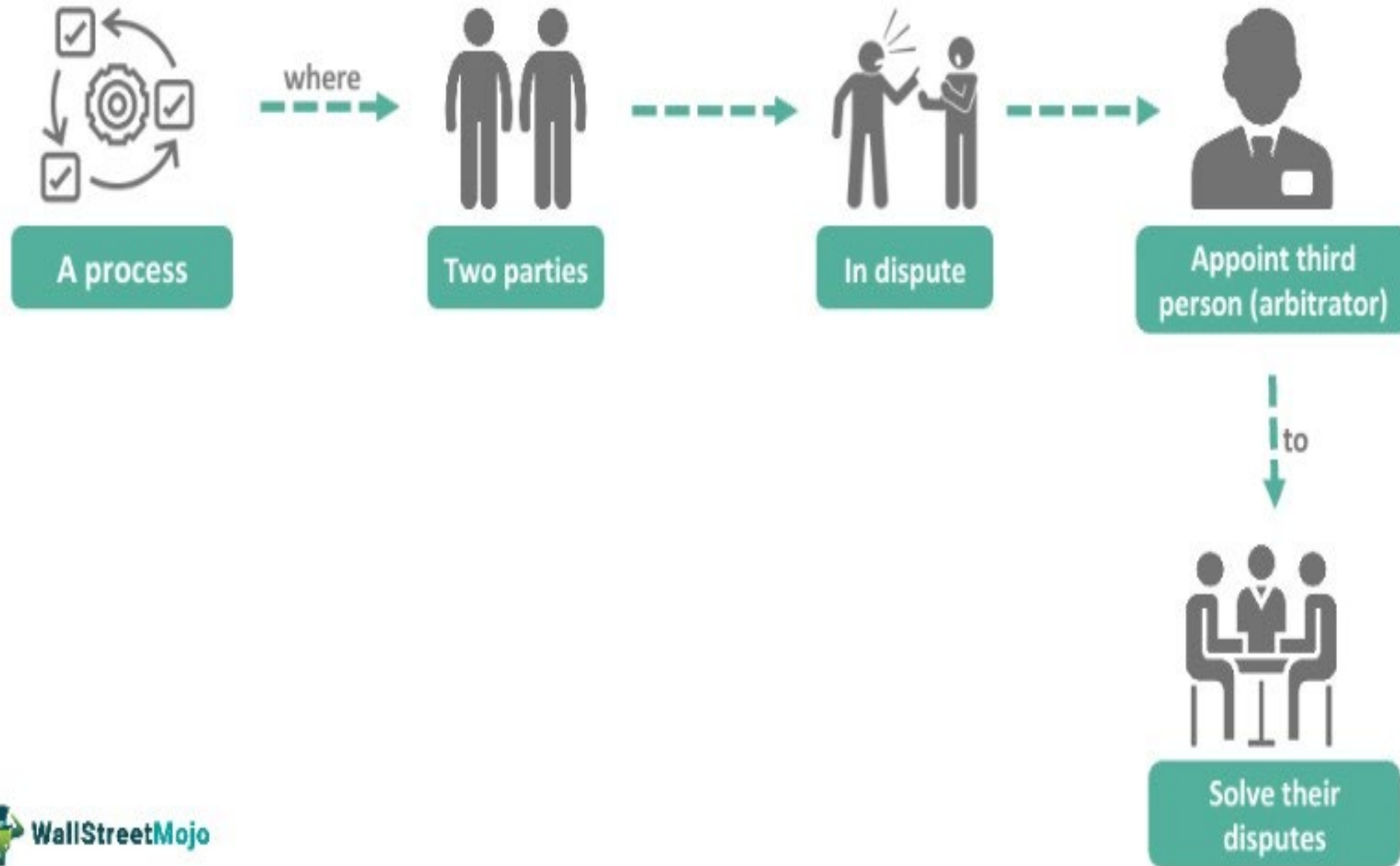
Arbitration

court.

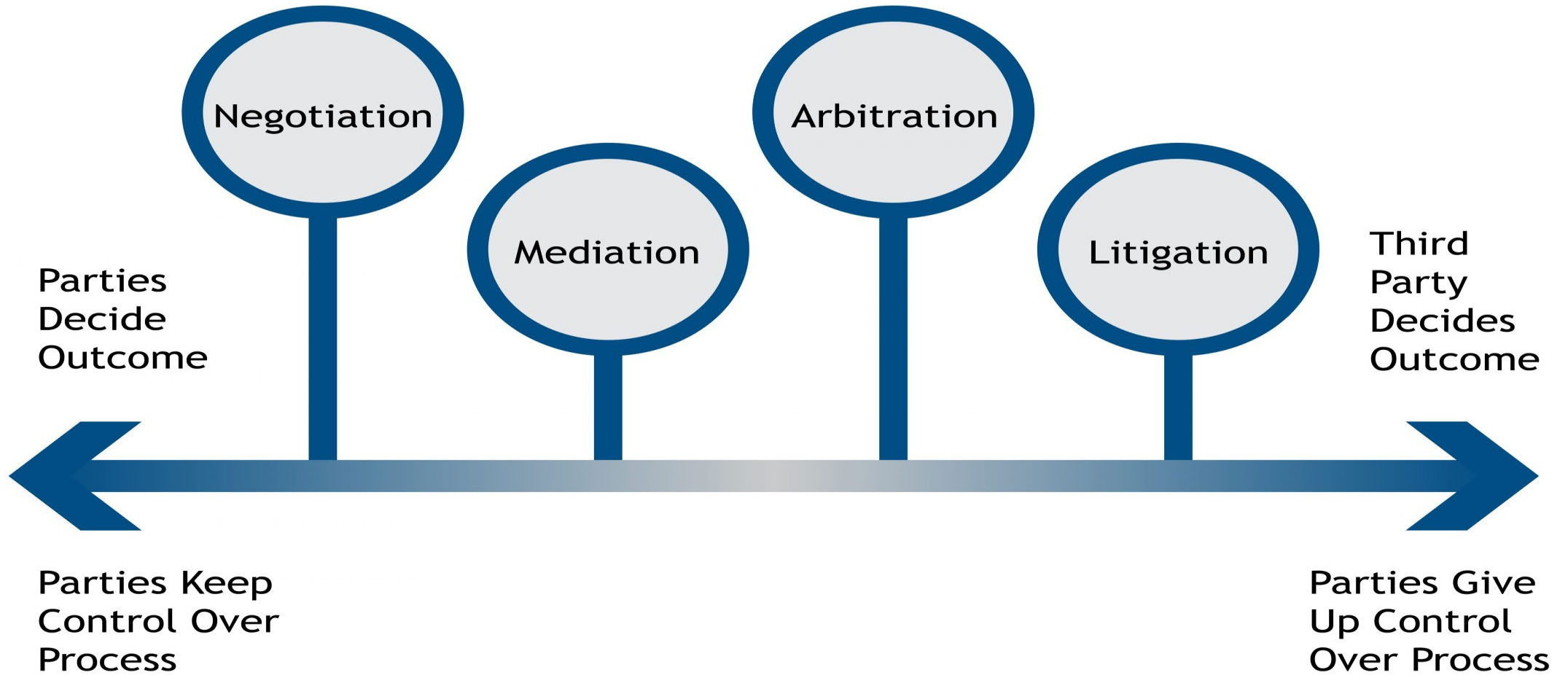
Arbitration

- ▶ *Arbitration is consensual*
- ▶ *The parties choose the arbitrator(s)*
- ▶ *Arbitration is neutral*
- ▶ *Arbitration is a confidential procedure*

What Is Arbitration?




ADR Continuum




ARBITRATION vs

LITIGATION



Arbitration resolves disputes by appointing a neutral third party to study the case, receive the evidence, and then make a binding decision.

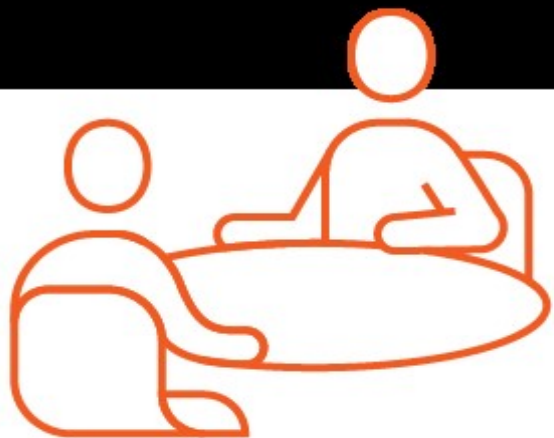


Litigation is a legal process in which the court decides the outcome for the dispute.

Deposition

▶ a statement by a witness
made under oath.

The Difference Between Deposition and Testifying



DEPOSITION

- ▼ **When:** Before the trial
- 👤 **With Who:** You and both lawyers
- ? **Questions:** You may hear some questions for the first time and must answer all questions asked
- 🎯 **Purpose:** Gather evidence for both attorneys and record your testimony



TESTIFYING

- ▼ **When:** During the trial
- 👤 **With Who:** Everyone in the trial
- ? **Questions:** You'll be more prepared for the other side's questions and unrelated questions can be dismissed
- 🎯 **Purpose:** Support a specific issue within the case

Dower

- ▶ Dowry
- ▶ Prompt dower
- ▶ Deferred dower
- ▶ Specified dower
- ▶ Proper dower

Release

▶ can be used in a variety of contexts, such as:

1. In the context of a person:

A prisoner being released from jail.

2. In the context of information or media:

Bakhtyar Alis new book being released for sale.

3. In the context of a product or service:

A new product being released by a company.

4. In the context of emotions or tension:

1. Energy being released in a chemical reaction.

Divorce



▶ *Divorce/is typically associated with the legal dissolution of a marriage. However, it can also be used metaphorically or in extended contexts to describe the ending or severing of relationships other than marriage.*

1. Business:

1. *"The company decided to divorce itself from its underperforming subsidiaries."*

2. Politics:

1. *"The politician's controversial statements caused him to divorce himself from his party's support."*

3. Personal Relationships:

1. *"After years of collaboration, the two artists decided to divorce their creative partnership."*
