<b>Presentation Title</b>	<b>What to Prepare</b>	<b>Format</b>
<b>1. Explaining a Custom from Your Country</b>	Choose a tradition (like a holiday). Explain what people do, what it means, and why it's important. Use pictures.	3-minute individual talk. Introduce, explain the steps, and conclude with its importance. Followed by Q&A.
<b>2. My Dream Job and Why I Want It</b>	Describe your ideal job. Talk about the daily tasks and explain why it fits your personality and skills.	3-minute individual talk. Name the job, give 2-3 reasons why you want it, and explain why you are a good fit.
<b>3. How We Communicate: Then and Now</b>	Compare old communication methods (letters) with new ones (social media). Discuss the good and bad parts of this change.	3-minute individual talk. Use "then and now" pictures and give your opinion at the end.
<b>4. Debate: Does Technology Help or Hurt Our Friendships?</b>	One partner argues "for" technology in friendships; the other argues "against." Prepare at least two reasons for your side.	5-minute pair debate. Each person speaks for 2 minutes, followed by a 1-minute discussion or rebuttal.
<b>5. A Person I Greatly Admire</b>	Choose someone you look up to. Explain what they did and what qualities you admire about them (e.g., courage, kindness).	3-minute individual talk. Tell a short story about this person and show a picture of them.
<b>6. How to Solve a Problem in Our Community</b>	Identify a local problem (e.g., too much trash). Suggest two or three simple ideas to help fix it.	4-minute individual or pair presentation. First, explain the problem, then present your solutions.
<b>7. My Review of a Movie or Book I Liked</b>	Choose a book or movie. Briefly explain the story (no spoilers!), say what you liked, and if you recommend it.	3-minute individual talk. Show the movie poster or book cover and give a clear recommendation.
<b>8. An Important News Story and Why It Matters</b>	Choose a recent news story. Explain the main facts and discuss how it affects people around the world.	4-minute individual talk. Use a map or news photos to help explain the story.
<b>9. Talking About a Famous Unsolved Mystery</b>	Research a mystery (e.g., the Bermuda Triangle). Tell the basic story and two popular theories about it.	4-minute individual talk. Use interesting pictures to make your presentation feel mysterious.

<b>10. Why Thinking Positively is Good for You</b>	Explain the benefits of a positive attitude. Share simple tips for being more positive in daily life.	3-minute individual talk. Keep the tone encouraging. You can end with an inspirational quote.
<b>11. Comparing Daily Life in Two Different Countries</b>	Choose two countries. Compare one part of life, like food, school, or family. Find photos to show similarities and differences.	4-minute pair presentation. Each partner can present one country, then compare together.
<b>12. A Character from a Story I Want to Meet</b>	Pick a character from a book or movie. Describe their personality and explain why you'd like to meet them.	3-minute individual talk. Be creative and explain what makes the character interesting to you.
<b>13. My Predictions for Life in the Year 2050</b>	Make one or two predictions about the future (e.g., transportation or jobs). Explain why you think this will happen.	4-minute individual talk. Use futuristic pictures to make it more interesting.
<b>14. The Best Way to Say "I'm Sorry"</b>	Give 2-3 simple tips on how to give a good, sincere apology. Give an example of a good vs. a bad apology.	3-minute individual talk. Keep the advice clear and simple. You can act out a short example.
<b>15. A Big Goal I Have and My Plan to Reach It</b>	Share an important future goal (e.g., learning a new language). Explain the simple steps you will take to achieve it.	3-minute individual talk. Share your real plans in this personal presentation.
<b>16. What Makes a Good Friend?</b>	Talk about the most important qualities in a friend (e.g., honesty, being a good listener). Tell a short story about a friend.	3-minute individual talk. Speak from the heart to make it relatable for your classmates.
<b>17. An Important Memory from My Childhood</b>	Tell a story about a specific memory from your childhood. Explain the lesson you learned from that experience.	3-minute individual talk. Focus on telling a good story with a clear beginning, middle, and end.
<b>18. Pitching a New and Useful Product Idea</b>	Invent a simple product that solves a common problem. Prepare a short, persuasive pitch to sell the idea to the class.	3-minute individual talk. Be energetic and convincing. You can show a drawing of your product.
